Dysart considers new public trailhead

Haliburton resident Carolyn Langdon is calling on Dysart et al council to establish a new public trail system that would one day connect the future County Road 21 development to the rest of the community. Representing the Friends of Grass Lake advocacy group, Langdon pitched elected

officials at last week’s (July 28) council meeting. “We are requesting a formal, phased, active transportation corridor. We want to connect the new municipal property to Glebe Park,” Langdon said. “This would create a safe, walkable corridor from one part of the village to another.” The idea, she said, would be to map out

a trail from the approximate 10-acres the municipality has set aside for a public park and have it run to the property’s northern border. It would then cross several other parcels owned by the township, and one private lot, before connecting to Glebe Park. Because of the extensive trails system already in place at Glebe Park, Langdon said people would be able to travel into the

downtown without walking along a busy highway. It would also provide access to Halbiem Crescent and Bayshore Road – not an important feature today, but could be significant, Langdon said, if the township builds a new recreation facility on the CR21 property. an arena, curling club and swimming pool being built, with council setting aside space in early development proposals that could, potentially, accommodate all three.

Langdon did not present any costs or timelines, later telling *The Highlander* that while the project was thought up by the Friends of Grass Lake, with help from former MP Barry Devolin, she hoped the township would take it on. She didn't think it would be an expensive project.

"We can look to Europe and the UK for a successful model. These regions have thousands of miles of historic, low-impact paths that cut through various properties. They don't require heavy infrastructure – often, it's just a simple, unpaved path," Langdon said.

She pitched the trail as an economical alternative to the township extending sidewalks out to that stretch of town. Using something like crushed granite would require minimal upkeep. Langdon has outlined a potential route for the trail.

She made two official requests – that council formally protect a right-of-way corridor in all development plans moving forward and that staff work with consultant, Biglieri Group, which is helping the township with its development plan, to include a trail in future proposals.

Council spoke favourably about the idea, with mayor Walt McKechnie, deputy mayor Pat Casey and coun. Barry Boice expressing support.

"It's a great idea in principle, but if you look at some of the areas on the map there are some things that come into play – there's some wetlands out there, so we have to be careful," Casey said. "This will also cost money at the end of the day – we'll have to bring surveyors in... we have to look at this more before agreeing."

McKechnie said he thought "it'll be a great little hiking trail."

'Good for community'

Langdon said investing in the system would greatly enhance one of Haliburton's best features – its walking trails.

"There is a proven trail culture in Haliburton – when you consider the popularity of the Hike Haliburton festival and the high use of Haliburton Highlands Land Trust (HHLT) trails, this would be a great addition," she said, noting the trails could also be used for educational purposes.

"There is a wetland, so maybe a boardwalk becomes part of the conversation. There are groups in our area who have experience doing that kind of thing," Langdon said, noting the recently-reopened boardwalk in Minden is a popular destination for school nature trips and environmental programming through groups like HHLT and Environment Haliburton!

William Vitalis has been cottaging in the Highlands for his entire life. Spending

summers growing up on nearby Peninsula Road, he feels a trail would be well-used by residents and visitors alike. His son, Ishvara, feels it would be a great addition for youth.

"I like biking over in Glebe Park, so for me this would be great. I'd have a closer connection to the park, but also just having a longer route, being able to see more of our green spaces would be good," Ishvara said.

William added, "and if the township is seriously talking about having a rec facility on this new property, leaving space for a trail would be a great way to plan and prepare for that by making sure people have various ways to access it."

Township planner Kris Orsan said the idea would be discussed with Biglieri Group and brought back to council in the fall.

Impaired driving charge

Two people have been charged with impaired driving offences over the past week, with Haliburton Highlands OPP warning the public about the potentially fatal risks involved with operating a car or motorized boat while under the influence.

Haliburton Highlands OPP charged 50-year-old Christopher Clements, of Cambridge, following a routine traffic stop last Tuesday (July 28). Police officials said they stopped Clements around 8:20 p.m. after catching him travelling eastbound on Loop Road. Clements was not wearing a helmet.

Police said they launched an impaired driving investigation immediately after stopping Clements. He was charged with operation of a vehicle while impaired; failure or refusal to comply with a demand; two counts of operation while prohibited under the Criminal Code; offenses for driving without plates, permit or insurance; and failing to wear a proper helmet.

This past Tuesday (Aug. 4), officers were on general patrol on Hwy. 35 south of Minden when they noticed a vehicle driving erratically. Following a traffic stop, 53-year-old Shari-Lyn Cripps of Keswick was charged with operation while impaired (blood alcohol concentration 80-plus);

driving with improper headlights; having care or control of a motor vehicle with an open container of liquor; and failure to surrender insurance.

Both drivers had their vehicles impounded for seven days and licences suspended for 90 days. They are scheduled to appear in court in Minden at later, unscheduled dates.

Busy weekend

Members of the OPP's snowmobile, ATV and vessel enforcement unit (SAVE) were active throughout the Civic holiday weekend (Aug 1-3), with active patrols throughout cottage country – including in

Haliburton County.

Police say 42 charges were laid and 56 warnings issued for infractions involving marine and off-road vehicles. Alcohol-related and lifejacket violations accounted for more than half of all charges laid during the effort, including 14 Liquor Licence and Control Act offences.

"Alcohol and boating do not mix. The consequences of operating a vessel while impaired are the same as those for impaired driving on Ontario highways and can result in criminal charges, licence suspensions and other significant penalties," OPP spokesperson Ashley Taylor said. *(Mike Baker)*

OPP engaging public on strategic plan

Haliburton Highlands OPP detachment commander, Deb McClure, highlighted efforts to tackle online fraud, improve traffic safety, discussed new technology, and mental health partnerships, when she presented the board's annual report July 23.

Tabled at the meeting in McClure's absence, the document included crime, traffic enforcement, and community well-being data, and highlighted initiatives and successes from the past year.

McClure noted 2025 was the last year of the 2023-2025 detachment action plan and her report provided a final update and progress results from the plan. She said she was proud of the dedication, professionalism and work undertaken by members throughout 2025.

McClure said online fraud incidents continued to challenge residents across Haliburton County. "In response, we expanded our outreach efforts with targeted education sessions and in-person presentations, helping individuals recognize emerging fraud tactics and protecting themselves. As criminal methods evolve, our collaboration with community partners remains vital in identifying trends, supporting victims, and preventing future offences."

The detachment commander added traffic safety remained a key priority. "By focusing enforcement and education on the 'big four' offences: speeding, impaired driving, distracted driving and lack of seatbelt use, we continued to reduce collision rates and enhance road safety across the region."

McClure added that throughout 2025, "we advanced and expanded our use of new technologies introduced in recent years. The integration of body-worn cameras, in-car cameras, and automated licence plate recognition has strengthened evidence collection, increased transparency, and enhanced officer and public safety."

She said they also successfully integrated new radio systems, improving communication reliability in Haliburton County's challenging geography and supported more effective and co-ordinated frontline response.

"These technological advances further support operational effectiveness and member safety."

"We also continued our partnerships to

support individuals experiencing mental health crises. Working with Haliburton Highlands Health Services and other community agencies, we advanced co-response approaches that reduced barriers to care and ensured people received timely, appropriate support."

As they close out the 2023-25 action plan, McClure said she was encouraged by the progress made across all priority areas. "This work has strengthened our community relationships, enhanced service delivery, and positioned us for continued success."

Later this year, they will release their 2026-29 action plan; the first developed under the Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA).

"We are working closely with our detachment board and engaging with

community members to ensure the needs of our communities are reflected in the commitments we make for the next four years," McClure said.

She added the plan will coincide with the creation of the 2026-29 OPP strategic plan creating organizational alignment.

Police in the schools

Board chair, Andrew Fletcher, said the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police, and the OPP police commissioner, want more OPP engagement in schools.

He said it had been a contentious issue over the last number of years; with police officers initially in schools, then a push to pull them out. In 2025, Bill 33 was passed,

mandating police returning to schools.

Fletcher said the chiefs want local detachments to develop police and youth engagement strategies, focusing on relationship-building and prevention, rather than enforcement.

Fletcher called it, "a good news story when we get back into the schools and build those relationships with the youth."

Board member Andrew Hodgson added, "I think we should fully endorse that. I think the police should be in our schools. I think they should be in the high school. I'm in favour of enforcement."

He recalled when police visited Hal High when he attended, and said students knew it. "We should encourage all the schools and police to be a part of it."

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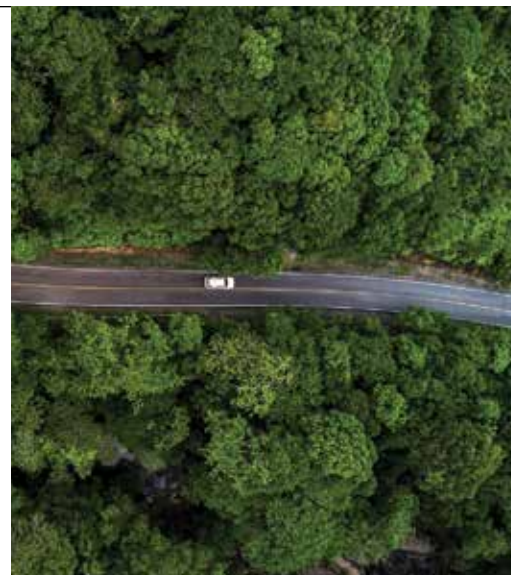
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Stores embrace madness

A shift in tradition and a good dousing of summer rain weren't enough to stop shoppers from taking over the main street for Haliburton's annual Midnight Madness this past Saturday (Aug. 1).

While the event was a success for many downtown shops, the move from its usual Friday night timeslot became a bit of a debate over local tradition and tourist foot traffic.

In the past, Midnight Madness was held on Friday nights, but this year it was shifted to Saturday (Aug. 1) evening. The move, backed by heavy advertising and promotion on social media, had some business owners feeling anxious as opening hour approached, especially when rain rolled in.

"We were worried at first with the weather being the way it was," Delancey Sports co-owner Erika Mozes told *The Highlander* on Monday.

Mozes said she texted her partner and business co-owner, Josh Karam, just before 7 p.m., thinking aloud that maybe moving the big sale to the following day might be a better option.

"And then 15 minutes later, the store was just hopping. There were so many people coming in, it was really great," she said.

The rain pushed people directly into downtown stores, with businesses reporting shoppers right through to the late hours of the event.

"It worked out to be one of the best Midnight Madnesses that the store has ever done since we've been located in Haliburton," Hywel Lee, store manager at Algonquin Outfitters, said while adding he welcomed the move to Saturday. "It gave the cottagers time to get up on Friday and come in to shop on the Saturday as planned."

Over at Mixtape Vintage, foot traffic stayed steady past the typical wind-down time.

"During the weather, it was a really good turnout; I had people right until 11," Heidi Hudspith said. The store owner noted that the later hours brought a spike of "younger shoppers from nine to 11 p.m."

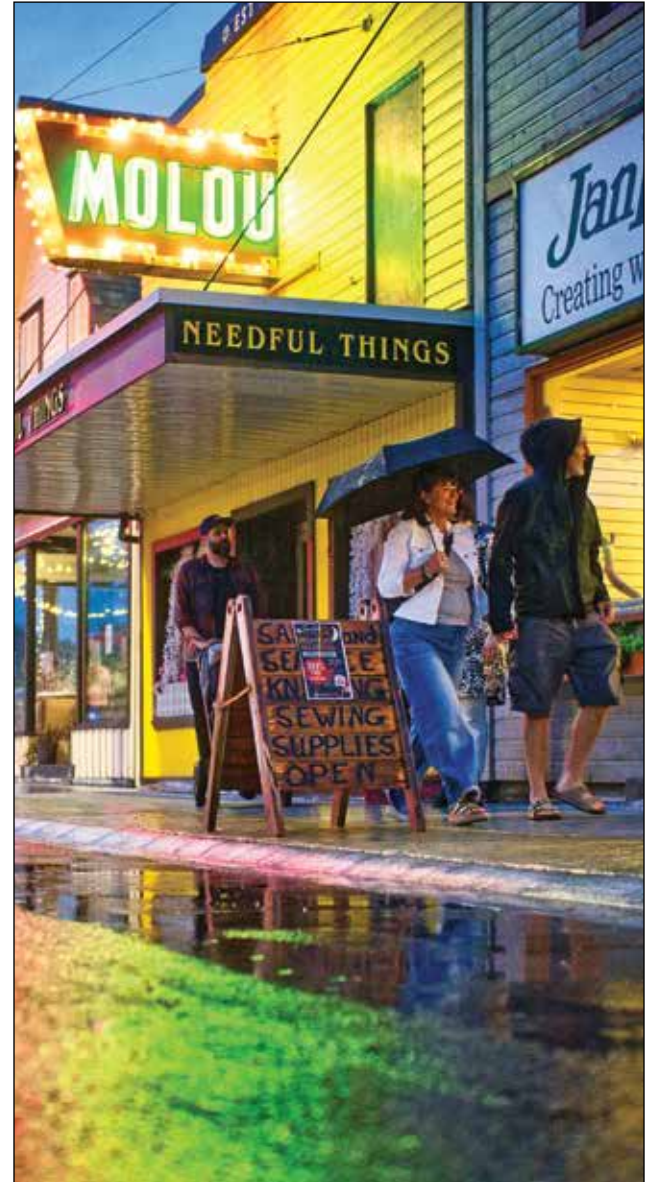
Glecoff's Family Store was also steady with customers right up to Saturday's curtain call. "I think everyone that was in town was in the store and a lot of local people, which was great," Emily Glecoff said. "It started at about 8 p.m., and we were busy until about 10:30 p.m., so it was really good."

While sales were strong, matching or exceeding previous years, some businesses said there was a bit of a shift in customer demographics with the move to Saturday night.

"We had a lot of people ask us why it was moved. I think some people were a little bit upset about it," Mozes said, but noted that overall traffic into the store was great.

"I felt like the people that were most upset about it were the people that have been coming for 50 years and always come on the Friday," Hudspith explained.

When asked about whether the new home for Midnight

Madness should be Saturday night, Algonquin Outfitters gave a resounding "100 per cent" vote while Mixtape suggested ramping up live music past 10 p.m. to keep the street party vibe alive, while acknowledging that the weather was a factor on Saturday.

Delancey Sports said they would be happy to defer to the public.

"In terms of traffic and people coming out, we saw the same levels of support that we've seen in past years," Mozes said. "I would rather just let the people of Haliburton decide, because for us, we'll be open, we'll be here, and we'll do our Midnight Madness stuff for them."

Mayor defends Minden raises

Minden Hills mayor Bob Carter defended large wage increases for three staff members in 2025, including the CAO, director of public works, and supervisor of waste management.

According to the public sector salary disclosure 2025, chief administrative officer, Cynthia Fletcher, made \$187,046 – compared to \$180,865 in 2024 – up \$6,000. Her predecessor, Trisha McKibbin, earned \$137,774, in 2022.

According to the 2025 list, director of public works, Mike Timmins, made \$147,555, versus \$126,961 in 2024 – a \$20,594 jump.

Supervisor of waste management, Chelsea Cosh, did not appear on the 2024 Sunshine List, but made it last year, being paid \$106,705.

Carter said the sunshine list does not provide all of the facts behind council's decision surrounding salaries and taxable benefits. For example, he said all three staffers are now working more hours.

"When we took over this term, our salaries were a real mishmash of things that had grown over the years. We had people working 35-hour weeks, people working 37.5-hour weeks and people working 40-hour weeks.

"We had situations where we had supervisors working 35 hours and their staff working 40 ... so what we have tried to do is standardize and move almost everybody to 40-hour weeks."

The mayor added while it appears their salaries have risen, the total cost to the

township hasn't necessarily gone up. For example, he said if they work a 40-hour week now, they are not eligible for as much overtime pay.

Carter added, "I will put our salaries up against any other municipality of similar size and with jobs of similar stature. Our salaries are not out of whack. We looked at them carefully and everybody on council approved these salaries."

By way of comparison, Dysart et al CAO Tamara Wilbee pulled in more than \$203,000 last year, Algonquin Highlands CAO Angie Bird made just under \$168,000, and Highlands East staff lead Brittany

McCaw more than \$135,500.

Dysart's director of public works, Rob Camelon, earned more than \$152,000; Adam Thorn of Algonquin Highlands nearly \$140,000; and Perry Kelly of Highlands East more than \$135,786, with Highlands East environmental staffer Patrick Thompson making more than \$110,000.

Carter reiterated in an interview last week, the increases "came about because of change of hours. You work more; you get paid more. The justification is they are being paid commensurate with what the job pays across the market."

Tackling unlicensed STRs

Council has passed an administrative monetary penalty (AMPs) bylaw to give it more teeth when dealing with unlicensed short-term rentals (STRs).

Currently, licensed STRs operate on a demerit point system. They are issued when an owner is in violation of the bylaw. If demerit points add up, STR owners may not be able to renew their licence.

However, the issue is if owners don't have a licence, the township can't give demerits, and there are no set fines for non-compliance.

Staff said there's now no recourse for not obtaining a licence and the township has little control over safety and occupancy at the property.

"The current situation poses several concerns around safety, fire safety, occupancy, noise, and issues with neighbours. Currently, the township has roughly 62 non-compliant short-term rentals," staff said.

They said using an AMPs bylaw will assist the township in addressing non-compliance. They allow the township to issue financial penalties for bylaw violations through an administrative

process, rather than through the provincial court system.

They are commonly applied to minor infractions, such as parking, noise, animal control, and licensing violations. Under the system, when a penalty notice is issued, the recipient may either pay the fine or request a review through a municipal screening and hearing process.

Initial reviews are completed by a screening officer, who is a municipal employee. Final decisions, if appealed, are made by a designated hearing officer, who is a separate third-party appointee.

The approach improves efficiency by reducing reliance on the court system, enabling faster resolution of disputes, and allowing municipalities to manage enforcement matters locally while maintaining fairness and due process.

The AMPs framework removes minor infractions from the provincial court system and allows municipalities to administer and adjudicate penalties internally. It also enables municipalities to retain 100 per cent of the revenue generated from penalties.

"Implementing AMPs will provide the township with an effective tool to issue and collect fines for non-compliant STR operators in a timely and efficient manner. AMPs may be expanded to other areas in the future," staff said.

Sidewalk improvements and roads study

Council directed staff to award the request for proposals (RFP) for sidewalk improvements to Weir Gradall Limited for \$331,425 plus HST.

Director of public works, Mike Timmins, said council had budgeted approximately \$350,000 for the project in the village. He said they issued the RFP in July and work is expected to take place in the fall.

There were three bidders and Weir Gradall was the cheapest.

At the meeting, council also awarded the RFP for a roads' needs, speed limit review, and traffic speed study.

The job is going to GEI Consultants Canada for \$99,730 plus HST. It was the cheapest of two bids. Council had allocated \$118,000 in the 2026 budget.

Timmins said, "these documents are critical in determining road maintenance, roads capital projects and financial forecasting. These studies and reports will serve as supporting documents for the township's asset management plan. It is best practice to complete a roads needs study every five years."

Lease renewal for doctor's house

The County has renewed its lease for a Haliburton property it uses for physician recruitment.

Physician recruitment co-ordinator, Wendy Welch, made the ask at a July 22 meeting.

She said they currently rent 1007 Deer Point Lane, Haliburton, but that lease expires Aug. 18.

There is a \$150-a-month hike, to \$2,350.

Welch said, "staff have a good and co-operative relationship with the property owners. With the exception of slow internet speed in that area, staff receive positive feedback from physicians who stay at this property."

She added there have been 102-night stays to date in 2026, and staff is projecting 100 per cent usage for the majority of 2026 associated with a local family physician living there until they receive permanent residency and can purchase their own home.

Hoping to go green

Council gave staff the green light to apply under the Federation of Canadian Municipalities' (FCM) sustainable municipal buildings grant.

Deputy treasurer, Tanya Rosenberg, said they want to evaluate retrofit options for the administrative office at 11 Newcastle St; the roads patrol yard at 1516 Ingoldsby Rd. Minden; the Haliburton Emergency Medical Services base at 6 South St. Haliburton; and the Tory Hill paramedic station.

"The proposed feasibility study represents an important opportunity to develop a long-term strategy for reducing greenhouse gas emissions from County-owned buildings while improving operational efficiency and protecting municipal infrastructure investments," Rosenberg said.

"Receiving FCM GMF (green municipal fund) support will reduce the financial impact on the County while providing the technical analysis necessary to guide future retrofit projects and support future funding application efforts."

Rosenberg estimated that with a successful grant, the total project cost would be \$87,741.50, with the County chipping in \$43,870.75, from patrol yard and ambulance reserves.

The deputy treasurer noted the County has identified reducing greenhouse gas emissions from municipal facilities as a priority through its corporate climate action plan and 2024 asset management plan.

County marks overdose awareness day

Ashley Smoke, the Haliburton Kawartha Lakes Northumberland drug strategy co-ordinator, urged council to proclaim Aug. 31 international overdose awareness day.

She said the designation mattered because overdose is often thought of as an issue affecting larger cities, "but we know that is not a reality."

"Rural communities like Haliburton are affected as well and they often face additional challenges such as greater

distances to services, limited transportation, and fewer local supports."

She noted that according to the office of the chief coroner, 20 people died from opioid toxicity in Haliburton and Northumberland counties and Kawartha Lakes in 2025. So far in 2026, the number

is 31 from January to May.

She said the region had higher rates of drug poisoning hospitalizations than the provincial average. Council made the declaration. (*County of Haliburton news compiled by Lisa Gervais*)

Public pays the toll as Lions raise \$7,500

Traffic was moving slowly throughout Haliburton village on Saturday (Aug. 1), though it was for a good cause as the Haliburton and District Lions Club held its annual toll booth fundraiser on the Maple Avenue bridge.

Volunteers set up around 8 a.m. and greeted drivers as they made their way in and out of town. One of those collecting, Renee Griffith, said hundreds of people dipped into their wallets to make a donation.

“Such a generous community – even those that haven’t been able to give anything stop and wish us luck,” said Griffith. One of the passersby, Cathy Dunne, smiled and dropped some cash in the bucket, saying she contributes every year.

David Mills, a longtime Lions club member, said the event raised more than \$7,500, which supports various projects and causes in the area. He said the toll booth is one of the club’s top fundraisers.

“This is money we would use to help people if they had a fire or other emergency,

or someone who needed new glasses, hearing aids or a wheelchair,” Mills said. “We provide a lot of help to the community that way, focusing on health and wellness.”

Funds are also used to help plan the annual ‘Stories in the Park’, with the latest edition coming up Aug. 26 at Head Lake Park from noon to 2 p.m.

Mills said there will be fun for the whole family, with games such as bean bag toss, mini putt, basketball toss, ladder toss and a fishpond will be available. There will also be a kids’ painting area. Gord Kidd will be

performing, while children’s author Carolyn Huizinga Mills will read her new award-winning book *I Drove my Bed to Grandma’s House*.

Mills noted all children in attendance will receive a new book they can take home.

“There will be free hot dogs, juice and popcorn. For adults we ask for a donation, but it’s open to anyone. It’s a way for us to celebrate and thank the community for all their support over the year,” Mills said.

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Best path forward

Carolyn Langdon's pitch to Dysart et al council last week (July 28) should be a no-brainer decision for local elected officials.

A member of the Friends of Grass Lake environmental advocacy group, Langdon encouraged the township to create a new trail system connecting future development on the township's 92-acre property to services and amenities within Glebe Park.

We've written extensively about Dysart's plans since it acquired the parcel in 2023 for \$1.725 million. While we know there will be substantial residential development, there's also been space set aside for a new multi-use recreational facility, long-term care home and a public park. If all goes to plan, the area should become another hub of the downtown community.

It seems pretty important then that council finds ways for people to come and go, other than using four wheels. It would be nice for new residents of the subdivision to have something, like a footpath or trail, that allows them to freely move around.

Shortly after the township bought the property, I remember meeting with our late mayor, Murray Fearrey, to learn more about the municipality's vision. I was impressed by the foresight, even if there was some risk involved with the purchase.

While much of the early talk focused on single family homes and apartment complexes, there's potential for a new arena, curling club and swimming pool. Negotiations are continuing for a possible

Extendicare site. One thing that has been pushed to the backburner though is public infrastructure.

This past spring even, councillors debated whether they should reduce the size of the planned park. Deputy mayor Pat Casey made the point that Haliburton already has a great facility in Head Lake Park in the downtown and he wouldn't want to overshadow that with a bigger and better park on the outskirts.

This trail seems like a good compromise. A proposed route will see the pathway stretch from the public park space on the south side of the property to its northern tip, tapping into an existing unofficial thoroughfare used by the Haliburton Highlands Nordic Trail and Ski Club, and other groups, through the winter. From there, it will traverse other township-owned lots before tying into the Glebe Park system.

Once at Glebe Park, people would be able to make their way into the downtown utilizing the trail system that surrounds Head Lake. There have been concerns raised that people living in the subdivision would have no safely-navigable way of walking to the downtown, potentially leaving them isolated. A trail addresses that.

It also goes the other way – by proceeding, council would develop a key artery that anyone in the downtown or Halbiem subdivisions could use for a safe passage out to the new development. This becomes especially important when

considering the potential new arena.

Langdon was unsure about potential costs, but I can't see it being excessive. The trail won't be paved and there's no need for the township to purchase additional land. It should be an easy job.

While council balked at Langdon's first request to commit to formally protecting a right-of-way corridor in all development plans moving forward, it did agree to forward the request to its consultant, Biglieri Group, which is managing the project. Several members spoke favourably about the initiative.

It's going to be several years before this trail is online, if it's even approved. Dysart is still in the early stages of its first phase of servicing, with plans to provide sewer access. It will then sell the lots to a developer. The rumoured Extendicare deal seems to be edging closer, with mayor Walt McKechnie saying he hopes to have a firm commitment signed by the end of this term.

Things are happening and changing quickly with that CR21 property – finalizing plans for this new trail is important as the township maps out its best path forward.

As an adult, he has kept a lower profile; no media documentation, but continues to enjoy living in the Highlands, where his family has been for generations.

Scheffee is unclear exactly how many generations his clan has lived in the County. Ancestry has never been a topic of conversation, but he speculates his forefathers and foremothers could possibly be original settlers. While unsure of any specific family history, he remembers the property his grandfather owned since the 1950s near Kennisis Lake in what is now Haliburton Forest. He has fond memories of spending summers with the patriarch and feels the love of camping and fishing is in his blood. His grandfather helped Scheffee hone his fishing skills, a hobby he enjoys today. When pressed for the location of his favourite fishing spot, he is coy, responding "Lake Notelly." Scheffee reveals he has good luck fishing on smaller waterways, "any lake that's hard to get to" is where he

likes to spend his time.

It is not all recreation for Scheffee as he has worked hard to own his home, just outside of Haliburton. After graduating from Hal High, many of his classmates left to explore the city, but Scheffee stayed, getting into the working world right away. He learned construction skills on the job, working for 12 years raising and leveling houses and cottages until suffering a back injury. Scheffee tried working through the pain but could no longer carry the cement blocks and do the digging underneath cottages the job required. It was while seeking medical treatment Scheffee discovered the downside of rural life – accessibility of health care.

Scheffee was frustrated at the need for constant travel outside the region for specialist appointments, but after driving many kilometres, an appropriate treatment plan was finally made. Scheffee had a successful procedure in Barrie to alleviate pain and is awaiting back surgery. He was unable to return to his original job of digging and masonry work, so Scheffee founded his own property maintenance company, and also assists a contractor with renovation projects.

His injury has halted snowboarding, but Scheffee still enjoys fishing and an occasional round of golf. A relaxing

evening for Scheffee is to stay home with his two huskies. Being documented in *The Highlander* once again is a surprise, but this time instead of showcasing his athletic prowess as a hockey player or skateboarder, Scheffee wants to be noted as someone who, "treats everybody like they're a somebody." The world is not getting any kinder." Scheffee is content living in the Highlands - a place to slow down and where people are kind.

'It's only 20 minutes'

Dear editor,

I fully understand the frustration over the temporary closure of Haliburton's LifeLabs.

Jane Taylor made excellent points in her recent letter. Seniors who cannot drive, residents without nearby family, the cost of taxis, and longer wait times - losing local access affects real people, and those concerns deserve to be heard.

Three years ago, Minden residents were raising those exact same concerns. The difference was that we weren't fighting to reopen a lab service - we were trying to save our emergency department.

While losing bloodwork access is inconvenient, losing emergency care can be life-altering. Yet when Minden's ER was permanently closed, we were told to adapt. We were told that an understaffed hospital 20 minutes away counted as "local" care and was in our best interest. Over and over, we heard the same four words: "It's only 20 minutes."

More than 25,000 people signed petitions. We held rallies, wrote ministers, and filled community centres. The ER closed anyway. Watching a critical emergency service disappear despite overwhelming advocacy changes your perspective. Did we ever stand a chance?

Many people in Haliburton County stood with Minden in 2023, and we haven't forgotten that. Together, we understood what was at stake. We tried to explain what losing local health care really means - and maybe now, more people understand.

Because, it turns out 20 minutes feels very different when you're the one making the drive.

I sincerely hope Haliburton's LifeLabs reopens soon. But more than that, I hope we can all agree that communities deserve better than being told to travel farther every time local care shrinks. These losses shouldn't be minimized, and they aren't something we should simply learn to accept.

After all, it's "only 20 minutes" to Minden for bloodwork.

How to get it

The best way is to go to thehighlander.app on your cellphone. On your first visit, you'll get a message encouraging you to install the app on your phone. Click this and the app will appear on your home screen so you can easily find it again.

How to use it

You don't need to create an account to use the app. But if you do, there are two benefits. First, you can choose which categories you want to see. Second, you can get notifications on your phone. There's a breaking news category, so anytime there is something urgent and important happening in the county, you can be notified. To create an account, just follow the links on the screen.

Why you can't comment on it

We know you might enjoy commenting on Facebook. But a downside of comments is that misinformation can spread. Without moderation, which is an impossible job for us, the value of the app would be lost. The Highlander's reporters are trained journalists, which means they follow rules so that what they post is as accurate as possible. They are also accountable because they live and work in our community. If they make a mistake, readers tell us – and we fix it. We hope that this approach will create an environment that is useful and pleasant.

A father's journal, his daughter's legacy

When Randall Linton originally sat down to write *This Little Light of Mine*, he had no intention of becoming a published author. He simply wanted to write a manuscript of memories for his five grandchildren, ensuring they grew up knowing the story of their aunt Elisa.

Elisa Linton died 10 years ago this Halloween at the age of 22 from Sanfilippo syndrome, a rare, terminal genetic condition sometimes referred to as childhood Alzheimer's.

This Little Light of Mine draws heavily on journals and photographs Linton maintained throughout Elisa's life, providing a real-time account from a father's perspective. The memoir was originally intended strictly as a private family record, Linton explained.

"I wrote the book originally for my grandchildren," Linton said while sitting in his cottage that overlooks Minden's Bob Lake. "I really wanted them to know who their aunt Elisa was, the inspiration she was, and the contribution she made to society."

However, after sharing his writing with some close friends, including a professional copywriter and an author, Linton expanded his manuscripts after getting some feedback.

"They both got back to me about a month later and said they felt this book needed to get out to a wider audience," Linton recalled. "There's so much in it that would benefit people."

The memoir has reached readers far beyond the lake and the Linton family. After selling out its initial 250-copy run at back-to-back launch events in June, the author ordered another batch to meet demand.

While he worked full-time for much of Elisa's life, Linton's wife, Elisabeth, stepped down from her career as a food stylist to care for their daughter and serve as executive director of the Sanfilippo Children's Research Foundation (SCRF), a charity the couple founded.

"I witnessed all of this," Linton explained. "I saw what Elisabeth was doing with our kids, going on media interviews, promoting the foundation. I thought when I sat down to write the book, it would be better coming from me who witnessed this... from a husband and father's perspective."

The father said that at times, writing proved to be very emotional and overwhelming, sometimes forcing him to step away for weeks at a time because memories of hospital stays and difficult breathing episodes resurfaced. But, the journey ultimately offered him a sense of processing, Linton recalled.

"It became very cathartic for me," Linton said. "It really helped me deal with a lot of what I was going through... having it come full circle."

Sanfilippo syndrome is caused by a missing enzyme that breaks down natural occurring cellular waste in the body. Without it, toxins build up in organs and the brain, causing a progressive decline in the body's function.

Linton reflected on the realities of watching his youngest daughter regress while at the same time trying to navigate the challenges of raising two older children and holding onto family faith.

"It's bloody tough. It's hell going through, watching your child go through this," Linton said. "When we closed the doors, and it was just us, it was hard... If it wasn't for our faith, I don't know if we would have got through it as a couple."

Through the SCRF, the Linton family has raised more than \$8 million and funded 32 research projects globally. Proceeds from *This Little Light of Mine* directly support two primary research centres: one in Cleveland, Ohio, and the other at CHU Ste-Justine in Montreal.

At the book launch in June, Dr. Alexey Pshezhetsky, a lead researcher from Montreal, spoke to attendees about how the foundation's \$1 million bursary is helping research that has now reached the cusp of clinical trials, Linton said.

"Seeing Elisa's legacy live on in both Cleveland and Montreal... you can't really put it into words," Linton said. "It's a real blessing."

For the Lintons, their cottage in Minden holds a particularly special place in Elisa's memory.

"We would sit her in the screened-in porch so she could feel the breeze and hear the activity on the waterfront," Linton recalled. "She loved it here."

A plaque sits outside, near the screened porch next to a tree planted in Elisa's honour, marking the spot where her ashes are buried overlooking the lake she loved.

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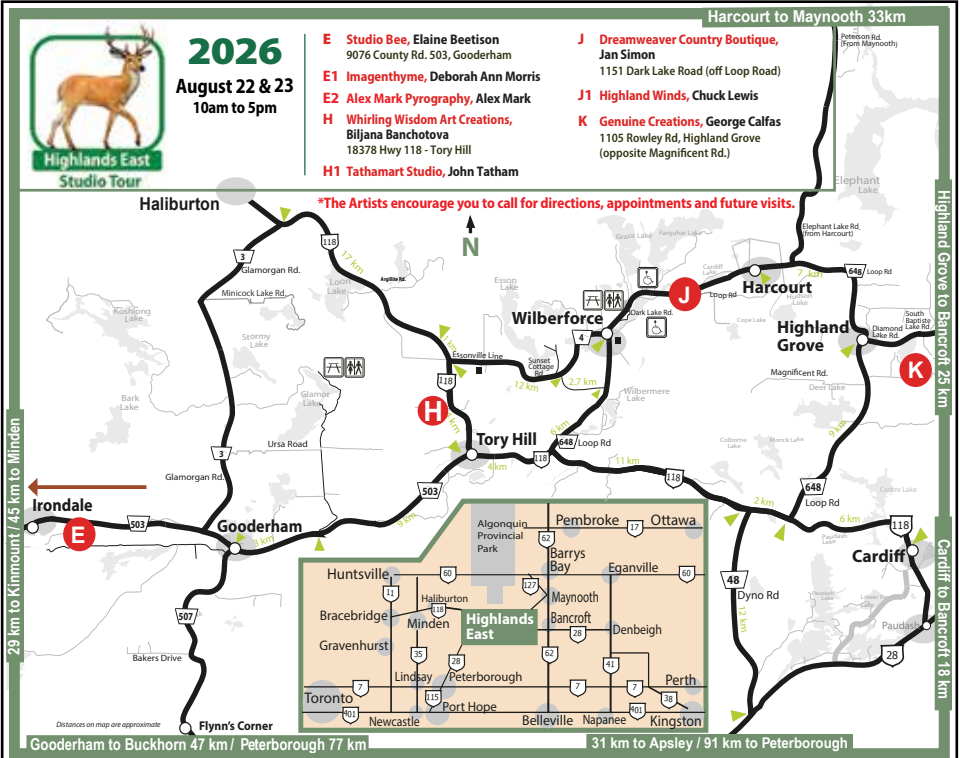
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School's in for art

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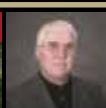


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Art on tour

“Earlier this year, the response to local flooding showed just how strongly Minden residents come together in times of need. Neighbours supported one another, helped protect the town, and demonstrated the power of community action when a challenge is visible and urgent.

“RotaryFest also helps draw attention to

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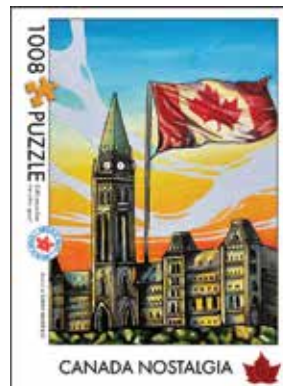
