Casey switches focus to run for deputy mayor

After a late change to his nomination papers last week, Pat Casey will now contest Walt McKechnie for Dysart et al's deputy mayor position in October's municipal election.

Casey, the current acting deputy mayor, filed for mayor May 19. He was expected to challenge Greg Bishop and Andrew Nowell for the township's top seat. However, last Thursday (Aug. 20), he withdrew from the mayoral race. He immediately filed to oppose McKechnie, who submitted his papers for a second term as deputy May 15.

Asked about the switch on Monday (Aug. 24), Casey said it was made with Dysart's best interests in mind, although he didn't get into specifics.

"I'm working towards the mayoral position, but this would give me another term to get closer to it, learn more and get up to speed. I feel like it's kind of a graduated system," Casey said. "There wasn't so much a turning point, or a piece of information that made me go 'holy jumpings, I'd better switch horses here'. I was just progressively thinking things through and thought about the team we could have."

Casey said he had been contemplating a switch for weeks but solidified his decision Aug. 18. He said his first call was to McKechnie to give him a heads up.

While McKechnie, Dysart's acting mayor, said he wasn't counting his chickens over a second-straight acclamation, he admitted he was surprised and disappointed by Casey's late switch.

Brighter election picture

There was a late flurry of political activity across the County last week, with the nomination deadline for October's municipal election Friday (Aug. 21).

After a low turnout in 2022, when 12 of 24 council positions in Algonquin Highlands, Dysart et al, Highlands East and Minden

Hills were filled by acclamation – meaning only one person registered for the seat – it's a much larger picture this time around.

There are 57 candidates, up from 41 in 2022. Most importantly, said Sean Pennylegion of the Haliburton Highlands Healthy Democracy Project (HHDP), there will only be one acclamation.

Karla MacKay will serve as the Ward 1

representative in Algonquin Highlands, replacing two-term councillor Julia Shortreed, who didn't seek re-election. There are contests for every other position, including five people vying for mayor in Highlands East, and four in Minden Hills. "To see this level of activity is incredible," said Pennylegion, who formed the HHDP

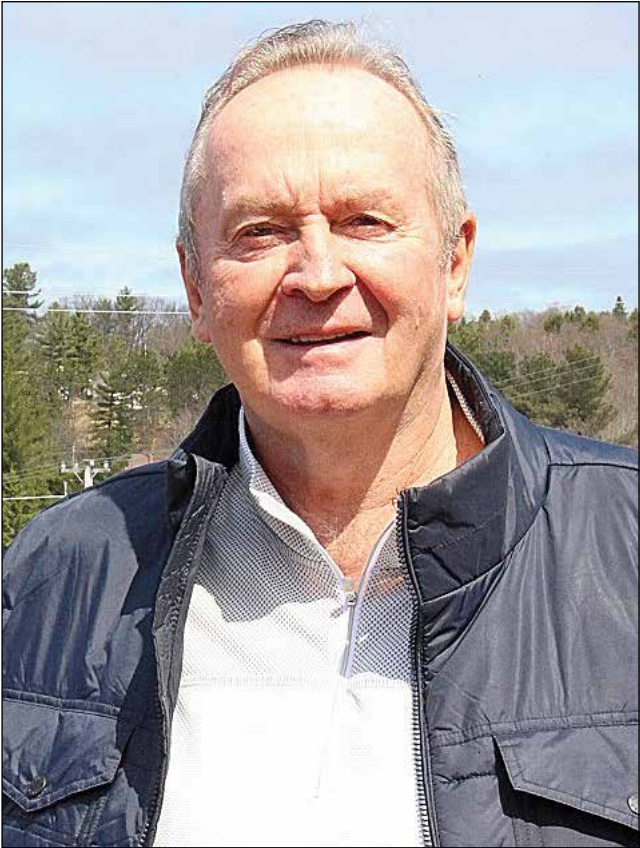

McKechnie disappointed by decision

The first-term official, initially elected as Ward 1 councillor in 2022, had until Aug. 21 to make changes to his nomination.

“We spent about an hour-and-a-half together the day before and he didn’t mention anything, so I was definitely caught off-guard,” McKechnie said.

“I never assumed I had a free ride. I was in a lot of hockey games leading going into the last minute and ended up losing, so I never wanted to think I was automatically in again,” the former National Hockey League player said.

“I’ve already been talking to people and am ready to hit the ground running with my campaign.”

Casey said his decision had nothing to do with Bishop and Nowell, or trying to project how the mayoral vote would land.

“I didn’t decide to do this because [I thought I was going to lose] – it would have been a good race between Greg and I. I think we’re equally capable of filling the position... but I feel, for Dysart and myself, it’s a better position for me to switch to deputy,” Casey said.

Key issues

Wrapping his fourth term, McKechnie said he’s proud of his service to the community, noting he wants one final run. If

elected, the 2026-30 term will be his last.

After seeing the township make major progress with the sewage treatment plant expansion and future development of the 92-acre County Road 21 property, McKechnie wants to see those two projects through to completion.

“(They) are absolutely vital if this community is going to grow,” McKechnie said. With his council experience, McKechnie felt he would be a good support for the future mayor.

Casey wants a seat at the table next term when County council has some major decisions to make – such as the Eastern Ontario Regional Network’s affordability and governance review. It’s being recommended the County’s four lower-tiers amalgamate in some way, with a decision expected early in 2027.

Neither Casey nor McKechnie are convinced amalgamation is the answer, though.

Casey said it’s too much, too fast. With such a big decision, he said they need to get it right as it cannot be reversed.

McKechnie is calling for some form of public vote or referendum before councils make a final decision. He said Haliburton County has a unique make-up and lacks industry. He thinks one-tier will lead to the loss of jobs, traditions and identity.

Advanced voting begins in Dysart Oct. 10, with voting day Oct. 26.

County adds advanced care paramedics

The Haliburton County Paramedic Service has introduced advanced care paramedics into front-line operations, in what it says represents an important step in the evolution of health care for residents and visitors across the Highlands.

The County of Haliburton said Aug. 18 that following council approval, the service (HCPS) has now deployed its first front-line advanced care paramedic (ACP).

The program is expected to expand over time, while simultaneously, primary care paramedics (PCP) continue to keep up with “rigorous” education requirements for “a dynamic and expanding” scope of practice, the County said.

Warden Dave Burton said he was pleased to see health services expand to offer more for residents of the region.

“We are fortunate to have dedicated professionals serving on the front lines everyday, making the Haliburton Highlands an exceptional place to live and visit.”

Every ambulance in Haliburton County is staffed by “highly-trained” PCPs, who provide “exceptional” care for the community, the County said.

It added the introduction of ACPs will

complement the team and provide early interventions for patients experiencing the most complex, or time-critical, medical emergencies. Some common examples of these include: electrical cardioversion, intubation, and the administration of advanced medications to control things such as extreme pain or seizures.

For residents and visitors, this means an additional layer of advanced clinical care is now available within Haliburton County, the County said.

The first person to serve on a frontline ambulance as an ACP in Haliburton County is Shawn Foster, a paramedic with more than 10 years of front-line experience.

The County said, “Foster’s achievement reflects both his personal commitment to professional development and HCPS’ ongoing investment in providing exceptional emergency care to the community.”

Chief Michael Slatter of the HCPS said last week’s announcement “reflects our commitment to continually advancing the care we provide to our community.”

“Our primary care paramedics already deliver exceptional care and are recognized for the progressive scope they practice under. Introducing advanced care

paramedics builds on that strong foundation, ensuring our teams have even more clinical support available when caring for patients with the most complex medical needs.

“We appreciate the support of both County council and our residents and visitors as we continue strengthening emergency health care for Haliburton County.”

The County added that the addition of ACPs “represents another milestone in HCPS’ ongoing commitment to delivering evidence-informed, patient-centred health care while continuing to build health care equity to meet the evolving needs of the community.”

with Lauren Hunter, Carol Moffatt, Barrie Martin and Jessica Slade to educate people about local political processes.

“We wanted to reduce the number of acclamations, get more people excited about local-level politics and to get involved. With three of four municipalities having 15 or more candidates, we definitely feel there’s an increased interest.”

All townships have more candidates, with 17 in Minden Hills (up from 11), 16 in Dysart (up from 15), 15 in Highlands East (up from seven) and nine in Algonquin Highlands (up from eight).

“The fact more people have put their hand in the air and said, ‘I can contribute’ is great, that’s exactly what we were shooting for,” Pennylegion said.

The HHHDP held four information sessions educating Highlanders about the realities of life in public office. It can be a thankless job, but one that has more of an impact on people’s day-to-day lives than almost any other, Pennylegion said.

“Local-level government is the one we see and feel the most. Roads, waste, recreation, water – all municipal,” he said.

Lay of the land

Liz Danielsen is seeking re-election for a second mayoral term in Algonquin Highlands. She will again duke it out with Mike Lang, who also ran in 2022.

Greg Bishop and Andrew Nowell are competing for mayor of Dysart et al, while

Pat Casey will battle Walt McKechnie for the deputy mayor position.

Incumbent Dave Burton faces stiff competition in Highlands East, where he’s seeking a sixth term. Steven Kauffeldt, Krystle Anne Pegg, Mike Killingsworth and Cheryl Ellis are also in the running.

There’s a four-person race in Minden Hills, with Bob Carter seeking a second term. Current councillors Pam Sayne and Tammy McKelvey are also on the ballot, alongside Pat Kitcheman. Ivan Ingram and Richard Bradley will go head-to-head for deputy mayor.

HHHDP is organizing all-candidates meetings in all four townships; from 9:30 a.m. to noon: Highlands East Sept. 12 at the Cardiff Community Centre; Minden Hills Sept. 19 at the Minden

Community Centre; Dysart et al Oct. 3 at the Haliburton Legion; and Algonquin Highlands Oct. 17 at the Stanhope Firefighters’ Community Hall.

Pennylegion said HHHDP will also be distributing mailouts before advanced polls open in October, so people know a little about each candidate. He hopes that will lead to a significant increase to the 26.59 per cent voter turnout in 2022.

“Our turnout was 20 per cent below the provincial average in 2022, which was already not great. I think it’s really important people realize this is the level where you can really have an effect as a voter, so get out there and make your voice count,” Pennylegion said.

Wellness clinics coming to County

The County of Haliburton’s Seniors Active Living Centre (SALC) program, Haliburton Highlands Health Services (HHHS), and Haliburton County Community Paramedics (HCPS) have announced a series of free wellness clinics across the Highlands.

The partners described them as “friendly, drop-in events” that will bring healthcare-related community support agencies together in accessible settings, making it easier for residents to find useful information, services, and connections, in one convenient place.

They are designed for older adults, but open to residents of all ages.

The County said on Aug. 18 that the clinics will offer a one stop shop approach.

“These are wellness clinics, and not medical clinics. A primary care provider will not be on site. Residents do not need a family doctor to attend, and no appointment is required,” the County said.

It added that support for caregiver respite on site will be available with a personal support worker attending. Free local event transportation will also be available for community members who book in advance. Call 705-286-1333 x.243 to inquire/book in advance. Light refreshments and snacks will

be available on-site.

The County said that by removing the need for appointments, and connecting multiple partners in familiar community spaces, the clinics aim to reduce barriers for residents who may benefit from timely information, referrals, screenings, education or connection to local supports.

On-site services could include: blood pressure checks; flu vaccinations; point-of-care glucose testing; inhaler education; connection to community supports; and medication reviews. Services may vary by location.

County warden Dave Burton said they were excited to welcome residents to the free events and to work together with partners to support community well-being. He added it is “about meeting people where they are, and making it easier to access the information and supports that can help them stay well and connected.”

Jack Hutchison, president and CEO of HHHS, said they’re grateful for the opportunity to partner with the County and bring care as close to home as possible. “Through our team in community support and outpatient services, HHHS is committed to reducing the inequities of access to care while being a model of excellence in rural health,” he said.

- March 11, 2027** 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Minden Community Centre, 55 Parkside St.

The County said funding for the program is provided by the Ministry for Seniors and Accessibility through the SALC program.

Dysart's new development eyes 119 residential units

Dysart et al council is moving forward with its planned residential and community development on County Road 21, after endorsing a preferred concept and vision for the municipal lands.

Consultants from The Biglieri Group presented two updated layout options during a regular council meeting Tuesday (Aug. 25). Both concepts, 3A and 3B, addressed municipal requests, such as swapping locations of a planned long-term care facility and a multi-use recreational facility.

Staff recommended going with concept 3A, a single-road layout designed to maximize housing density and cost efficiency. According to a staff report, the concept would allow for a minimum of 119 residential units, while utilizing a single primary road layout crossing an environmental buffer, which planners noted provides “the biggest bang for your buck” in terms of infrastructure efficiency.

Council focused on whether to include a highway commercial block at the front of the planned subdivision. Consultants cautioned that adding commercial space at the property's entrance complicates stormwater management.

“If the highway commercial block were to go in this area as requested... it essentially takes over the best location for a subdivision storm pond,” Biglieri Group's Evan Sugden told council.

The project lead went on to note that a

commercial zone would require multiple stormwater management solutions rather than a single unified solution.

“We felt it was better and more efficient for the municipality to keep a bigger multi-use block, a simpler stormwater management solution, and a cheaper stormwater management solution,” Sugden said.

Biglieri Group's civil engineer, Jamie Dick, also recommended a single

centralized pond.

“Ideally, one is the way to go here if it can function, work, and give the land the way you guys would like it to,” he told council.

Addressing the project's priorities, coun. Nancy Wood-Roberts voiced a preference for housing over commercial space.

Council endorsed concept 3A. The Biglieri Group will move forward with preparing and submitting the required Planning Act applications.

Medical centre repairs delayed

Council voted to cancel a tender for drainage improvements and foundation repairs at the Haliburton Medical Centre after receiving a single bid that exceeded municipal estimates.

Staff recommended holding off on the project until the next term of council after the lone submission from Total Site Services came back significantly higher than expected.

CAO Tamara Wilbee told council. “We don't have enough funds in the reserve that we're going to use to do that work, so we're recommending we cancel the tender and defer it to next year when we can budget for it appropriately.”

Wilbee said that municipal spending limits also prevented any quick workarounds.

“Given the amount, I can't use my delegated authority,” she explained.

The CAO also noted further issues were found at the building that is home to LifeLabs, which has been closed since the end of March.

“We've also just found some other

issues to remediate that we're going to fix on Thursday that we think might be contributing to some of the issues as well,” Wilbee said. “So, we'll have an update after that and know better where to go from there.”

Halbiem seeks lower speed limit

Residents of Haliburton by the Lake are seeking a community safety zone designation following an apparent near-miss at a school bus stop.

Haliburton by the Lake Association's Kim Stamp requested the Halbiem Crescent subdivision be designated after two children were almost struck by a speeding vehicle while a school bus was stopped with its lights flashing and safety arm extended.

“Our current speed limit of 50 km/hr is way too fast for the safety of everyone using the road system,” she told council.

The association is asking for the speed limit to be reduced to 30 km/hr.

Staff advised against a formal community safety zone, noting Dysart lacks a policy to evaluate such requests.

Dysart approves boat races for 2027

The annual Toronto Outboard Racing Club (TORC) powerboat regatta will return to Head Lake next summer after council approved the scheduling of the event for Aug. 13 to 15.

Council highlighted the event's public attendance and its contribution of \$6,000 raised for the Haliburton Highlands Health Services Foundation. Council did address some of the public feedback regarding event-related noise and parking shortages.

“I think we all have got to give a bit of grace to each other in regards to the different things we do in this town to attract different types of people,” acting deputy mayor Pat Casey said. He added that the event draws winter-tourism demographics, such as snowmobilers, back to the municipality during summer months.

Old fire hall

Responding to a council request for short-term options for the old downtown fire hall - while a long-term revitalization plan is being worked on - Minden Hills' chief building official, Tim Lewis, said at August's meeting that an open-air structure won't work.

The former fire hall was built in the 1970s and de-commissioned in 2018. The facility consists of a truck bay, storage, washrooms and public water filling station. Other than the washrooms, which were renovated in 2024 for public use, the former fire station is not used due to mould concerns.

Lewis said they asked Tatham Engineering's advice about removing interior walls and exterior cladding to create an open-air structure.

However, he said the structure was not originally designed to resist uplift forces. "Without the walls, the building would be continuously exposed to wind uplift loads, requiring significant structural reinforcement, such as new footings, uplift protection etc."

In addition to structural integrity concerns, Lewis said they were told removal of the exterior walls would result in the building no longer being heated, leaving the existing slab-on-grade foundation susceptible to frost heave and accelerated deterioration.

Lewis added that depending on plans, there may be portions of the structure that could be incorporated, or re-used, in a new design. The option would retain the public washrooms and water filling station. He said the other option is full or partial

demolition and the space prepared for additional parking.

Coun. Ivan Ingram asked if they could put it out to tender to have the building disassembled and sold. Lewis said it was a possibility. Ingram said they could move the washrooms and tap into the council chamber building.

Coun. Bob Sisson said he knew a farmer who would take the building. He added The Rotary Club of Haliburton had installed pre-fabricated washrooms at Skyline Park they could check into.

CAO Cynthia Fletcher said they were happy to investigate options, but they were not inexpensive.

Council received the report as information.

Lochlin Community Centre

Council voted to prepare a new request for proposals (RFP) for the Lochlin Community Centre.

Fletcher said that in 2025, an RFP was released seeking proposals from qualified individuals to supply and install a turnkey Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act-compliant and barrier-free community centre.

She said the 2025 tender was for a pre-fabricated structure, but had "become stale-dated as proponents are not required to hold their prices for more than 60 days, or as otherwise mutually agreed to by each respondent."

Fletcher said, "this RFP would specify the township's requirements and leave open the

method of construction."

She said the new RFP will be developed and released within the next month.

Moving up the hill

Fletcher asked council for permission to develop an agreement with the County of Haliburton to use the County's new council chambers.

She noted the County has completed a major renovation to re-locate the chambers to their 12 Newcastle St. site.

Fletcher said, "the Minden Hills council chambers is in need of renovations (ceiling tile, flooring, paint, furnishings) and improvements related to audio-visual equipment. Given the proximity of the County and Minden Hills council chambers, staff from both the municipality and County have been discussing the best use of investment dollars and the potential to share space for council meetings."

She added if they were to move, the Minden Hills council chambers could be designed as a much-needed modern meeting room.

Staff will present a draft shared space agreement with the County at a future council meeting.

Back-up generator and tandem truck

Finance director Zach Drinkwalter asked staff to award the purchase of an emergency backup generator for the S.G. Nesbitt

Memorial Arena - to Del Sharp Electric Ltd - for \$226,141.76 plus HST.

He noted the 2026 capital budget has \$300,000 allocated to the project. Drinkwalter said the township has applied for a Hydro grant for up to \$25,000 towards the project. If successful, it will receive notification in September or October.

Following a rollover incident on March 3, the township needed a replacement tandem truck.

At the meeting, Drinkwalter asked for permission to purchase a new one from Winslow-Gerolamy Motors Ltd for \$459,687.94 plus HST, to be reimbursed by the township's insurer.

Almost a wrap on arts foundation raffle

With nine days to go in the Haliburton Highlands Arts Centre Foundation’s (HHACF) ‘big online summer raffle’, the group’s president, Michael Clipperton, said all funds raised will help progress plans to bring a new performing arts facility to the area.

Launched in June, the raffle is HHACF’s first-ever fundraiser, Clipperton said. There are five price points for people to choose from – they can purchase one ticket for \$10, five for \$20, 15 for \$40, 50 for \$75, or 100 for \$100.

It’s being run online through Rafflebox, with \$1,950 raised as of press time on Wednesday (Aug. 26). Clipperton said the host site will take eight-to-nine per cent of the total winnings, with the rest of the pot to be split between HHACF and the winner.

“We’re hoping to net about \$1,000. This is our first attempt at a fundraising venture, and we’re pleased with how it’s gone so far,” Clipperton said.

It’s been four years since HHACF presented results from a feasibility study that suggested the Highlands community could sustain a “world-class” operation consisting of a 400-seat auditorium, rehearsal hall, backstage facilities, front of house lobby with concessions, office space for theatre management, and music studios.

The project was initially pegged at \$48 million, though the foundation said in 2025 it had scaled back elements of the project to bring anticipated costs down to \$30-35

million. In 2024, Dysart et al sold a 14-acre parcel on the corner of Wonderland Road and County Road 21 to HHACF for \$1 to serve as the home of the future build.

Clipperton said the group has invested more than \$200,000 so far commissioning various reports. Environmental impact and traffic studies have been completed,

with expensive archeological and hydrogeological analyses up next.

After running a community survey over the summer, garnering 60 responses, Clipperton feels he and the rest of the HHACF board have a mandate from potential users of the site.

“We heard that people are in support of the project, they are hopeful it will happen, but they have concerns – particularly about the cost of rentals and how we’ll make that sustainable,” Clipperton said.

He said one of the most interesting things coming out of the survey is that 80 per cent of the respondents admitted they leave Haliburton County for much of their entertainment, with Toronto and Casino Rama popular destinations.

While still working with Dysart et al and the County on the file, Clipperton reaffirmed HHACF wants to have shovels in the ground by 2030.

“We’re hopeful, but this is going to be a long and drawn-out process. Our consultants who did the initial feasibility study were involved in the construction of the art centre in St. Catharines and that was a 20-year process,” Clipperton said.

“We’re hoping to get up to 50 per cent of the project costs covered by provincial and federal grants, but we’d still need to raise our portion. At that \$30-35 million number, this would be the largest infrastructure project in the history of Haliburton County for the last 50 years,” he added.

What a difference

The race is officially on in Haliburton County, with 57 political hopefuls vying for 23 council positions in Algonquin Highlands, Dysart et al, Highlands East and Minden Hills.

Nomination deadlines for municipal council candidates passed on Friday (Aug. 21). It's a much different picture from four years ago, when exactly half of all available positions in the Highlands were filled by acclamation – meaning only one person registered for the seat.

After seeing 12 acclamations across the four townships in 2022, we have just one this election cycle. Karla MacKay will serve as the Ward 1 representative in Algonquin Highlands, replacing two-term councillor Julia Shortreed who didn't seek re-election. There are contests for every other position, including five people vying to become mayor in Highlands East and four in Minden Hills.

Beginning this week, *The Highlander* will be publishing a series of Q&As with council hopefuls. We asked them about their qualifications, the biggest issue in their township – and how they'd go about tackling it, and their overarching vision for the community.

Our hope was, by presenting vague and open-ended questions, we'd get a wide range of responses. That should, in theory, give readers the opportunity to decide for themselves which candidates fit their values and vision best.

I feel like there's a nice spread of candidates this time around. We have the older, more experienced heads looking

to give back to their community, but there's also a good number of working professionals who have stepped up to the plate. Ballots include those who were born and raised in the Highlands, as well as recent imports, full-time residents and seasonal.

Having read most of the answers, folks seem much more engaged and aligned on the key issues facing County townships over the next four years.

That's important, because these next councils are going to have to hit the ground running once they're sworn in. The affordability and governance review, prepared for the County by consultants the Eastern Ontario Regional Network, is arguably the biggest, most significant file in this community's history. Essentially, our next councils will decide whether or not to amalgamate Haliburton County.

Four options have been presented: maintain the status quo; have the County take on the bulk of municipal services and maintain the lower-tiers to handle bylaws and recreation; maintain the upper-tier County and merge Dysart et al with Highlands East, and Minden Hills with Algonquin Highlands; or a full single-tier amalgamation.

Each township also has its own challenges maintaining infrastructure, retaining staff, and keeping on top of major files such as the short-term rental and shoreline preservation bylaws.

Make no mistake about it, the 2026-30 term could be the most pivotal in this County's history. We know all townships

are struggling financially; change is desperately needed.

So, while it's a positive that we have a strong number of candidates, it's imperative voters get it right when hitting the polls in October. Our councils need analytical minds, the best of the best around the table to crunch the numbers and do a deep dive on everything presented by EORN, while also doing more of their own homework, too. We'll only get one crack of the whip to get this right.

There are other options for you to learn more about each nominee. The Haliburton Highlands Healthy Democracy Project has organized all-candidates meetings in all four townships, happening in September and October.

Average voter turnout in 2022 was a pathetic 26.59 per cent. That number must increase this time around.

Social media pages I regularly frequent have been filled with complaints about rising costs, service reductions, lack of recreational events and opportunities, and more. Just know, if you don't vote, you do have to forfeit your 'right to complain' badge.

So, get on it. Do some research, folks – election day is just 60 days away.

Like a superhero, Jewel Milligan has a secret identity. Afternoons and evenings, she is an energetic, friendly, server, welcoming hungry diners with a wide smile and engaging conversation. But once she removes her apron and returns to her Boshkung Lake home, she wants to be alone.

Once rejuvenated, Milligan does socialize, although not the loud nights out at bars or big parties common for young people in their 20s. She has a group of friends who enjoy going out to grab some ice cream, coffee or a bite to eat. A great evening for Milligan is a visit to a friend's home to play games or have a bonfire.

Milligan did try city life for a while, saying "when I was younger, I always thought I wanted to move to Toronto. I thought 'it's so fun, I would love it'." She attended York University for two years but didn't love it. The large campus was overwhelming, so she transferred to the smaller Orillia Lakehead University. The hour commute is alone time in the car Mulligan enjoys. It is an opportunity to listen to a podcast, and she finds the drive "relaxing, especially first thing in the morning. Extreme trans activism divisive

Dear editor,

Hate has no place in our society. Homophobia is repulsive and pathetic.

However, Pride parades can no longer automatically expect everyone's embrace. Much of the public is, or has become, indifferent to them. Many see them as now unnecessary and outdated or just a compulsory invitation to virtue signalling for politicians. I know gay people who want nothing to do with them and just want to live their lives without publicity and parades.

I would suggest the current rise in seeming anti-gay attitudes is not so much a reaction to regular gay community engagement, but an unfortunate and misplaced byproduct of recent polarizing issues.

Back in post-Stonewall days, when there was just LGB, and the fight for gay rights was gathering momentum in 1981, San Francisco hosted the International Lesbian and Gay Freedom Day Parade, inaugurating the growth of Pride parades everywhere.

That led to eventual gay rights recognition, protection laws, same-sex marriage, and finally now an entire month of world-wide celebrations. In the intervening 45 years, I would suggest that gay rights and gay lives are now considered irreversibly mainstream in free societies. There is no longer a need to campaign for gay visibility today in an age when the majority of people find homosexuality neither remarkable nor objectionable. There will, of course, always be intolerant and ignorant outliers.

The problem now is, like many social causes, an extreme activist minority has hijacked the gay agenda. Instead of LGB, we now have LGBTQIA2S+, and are told there are 54 kinds of gender and that sex is not binary, but a spectrum. The tipping point, however, has been in the last decade with radical trans activists commandeering the gay movement at the expense of gays in highly controversial, hostile, aggressive and divisive ways - violating women's rights by pushing trans women into women's sports, washrooms, changerooms, salons, prisons and shelters; pushing queer theory on children in schools without parental knowledge; promoting irreversible sex changes in vulnerable youth (being castrated or enduring mastectomies, using puberty blockers); using odd self-identifying pronouns; and aggressively attacking any opposition by waging cancellation or shaming campaigns, getting people fired or harassed, or filing human rights complaints over not having their identities properly validated (the novel crime of misgendering).

Sadly, reasonable pushback and

unpopularity to the extreme trans agenda have, by unfairly misplaced association, caused some underserving backlash, sometimes hostility, against the wider LGBT community, many of whom also disagree strongly with, or disassociate themselves from, extreme trans activism.

Editor's note: We are beginning our municipal election coverage this week with the contenders for Minden Hills' Ward 1, Ward 2 and Ward 3. We asked each candidate the same three questions and gave them a maximum of 150 words to respond to each query. We also requested photos. We will be featuring all candidates in wards where there is a race leading up to the Oct. 26 election date.



Ward 1 – Dan Garbutt

Q: What are your qualifications to run for council?

A: My qualifications come from over 20 years of owning and operating Highlands Towing, followed by my role as operations manager with our family business, Garbutt Disposal.

The current policies around planning and development can seem to be somewhat restrictive, which hinders growth within the community; accountability and fairness are key in achieving this. I believe that we can accomplish these things with a concerted effort by all of us, together, to make these things come to fruition. Not just the government; I feel we need to embrace personal contact with council and municipal staff



Ward 3 – Jeff Hancock

Q: What are your qualifications to run for council?

A: While I have no experience as a municipal councillor, I have worked in the engineering field for the past 35-plus years as an account manager for a large global company, serving hospitals, food plants, paper plants, nuclear plants, ethanol plants, steel mills and general manufacturing facilities.

In those roles, I learned many different processes and provided technical consultation to each client to protect their assets, reduce operating costs and deliver water and energy savings. Those same skill sets, coupled with my absolute love for this area, will allow me to represent Ward 3 constituents and fulfill my duties as councillor by acting as a problem solver. I will work hard to improve, protect and promote the area.

Q: What is your vision for the future of Minden Hills - and how would you bring that about?

A: I watched the presentation to County council Aug. 12 regarding the completed affordability and governance study. It was apparent not all County councillors were aligned. No matter how much the study findings tell us we need to do something different, and despite how hard the Haliburton County CAO is trying to keep this work and community engagement on track, I see no path forward with any County council making the final decision.

I'd rather see a Haliburton County-wide referendum vote in late 2027 or early 2028 where voters alone will decide our future and not the eight individuals on County council. Financial deep dives on the four presented models are the next step. That work should be completed by December 2026 and available to the newly-elected councils in all four municipalities. In early 2027, I would hope to see the newly-elected County council agree on, approve, and schedule a referendum vote.

Q: What do you think is the biggest issue in your township and how would you go about tackling it?

A: Since the last amalgamation, we have noticed a slow but steady decline in Ward 3 (former Snowdon Township) in three main areas. Our municipal roads are not maintained as well, or as often, our standing within the municipality has become secondary at best to the town of Minden, our rivers (Irondale, Drag and Burnt) have not been maintained since the MNR transferred that responsibility to the municipality.

I will work hard to find a solution to improve our road maintenance. Improving our standing within the municipality will be more difficult, but I guarantee I will try. Naming the municipality Minden Hills during the last amalgamation did not help, making it very difficult to differentiate between the town of Minden and the municipality itself. 'Highlands West' would have been more appropriate and inclusive. Getting Minden Hills working with whoever they need to on the rivers is a must. Doing nothing cannot continue.



Ward 3 – Lisa Mercer

Q: What are your qualifications to run for council?

A: I bring a combination of previous council experience, business experience, and a long history of living, raising a family, and working in our community. I served on Lutterworth council from 1985 to 2000, where I gained experience in municipal decision-making, budgeting and working with taxpayers to address local issues. Professionally, I owned and operated a successful title search company for many years and since 2009, I have worked as a local real estate broker.

Q: What is your vision for the future of Minden Hills - and how would you bring that about?

A: My vision for Minden Hills is a municipality that is transparent and focuses on the people who live here, as well as those who choose this area for their recreational property. We need to support responsible growth that strengthens our local economy while protecting the rural character and beauty that makes Minden Hills such a great place to live and play.

We need to ensure that taxpayer dollars are spent wisely. Many costs are mandated by the province; however, the council still has a responsibility to carefully evaluate every decision. I believe we can achieve this through open communication, respectful discussion, and thoughtful decision-making.

Q: What do you think is the biggest issue in your township and how would you go about tackling it?

A: I believe one of the biggest challenges facing Minden Hills is maintaining the services property owners expect, while managing rising costs and keeping taxes as affordable as possible. We need to keep looking for ways to be more efficient with the tax dollars we do control. Council needs to distinguish between essential needs and wants and make decisions that provide long-term value for property owners.

Equally important is the need for property owners to feel heard. Better communication and meaningful public engagement lead to better decisions and stronger community support. My approach would be to listen carefully, ask questions, review the facts and work with council, staff, and property owners to find practical solutions. We won't solve every challenge overnight, but by making responsible financial decisions and keeping property owners involved, we can put Minden Hills on a stronger path for the future.

Ward 2 – Brad Griffin

Q: What are your qualifications to run for council?

A: I have lived in the County for most of my life, and for eight years now, in Minden Hills. I have been a self-employed local businessowner for over 40 years and now retired. Throughout my career, I have developed a strong understanding of people, the importance of building relationships and the value of following through on commitments.

Ward 2 – Stephen Hertel

Q: What are your qualifications to run for council?

A: I bring more than 35 years of public service experience, including front-line law enforcement, supervisory and leadership roles, municipal service, emergency management, community outreach, and the fire service. Those experiences taught me how important accountability, teamwork, communication and sound decision-making are when serving the public.

As a volunteer firefighter and active member of our community, I understand the realities facing rural municipalities: from emergency response and infrastructure to limited resources and increasing costs.

I'm also someone who is prepared to ask questions, listen to residents, and respectfully challenge decisions when necessary. Council needs people who can work collaboratively while remembering they are accountable to taxpayers.

I am running because I care deeply about Ward 2 and Minden Hills. I believe my combination of municipal experience, public safety knowledge, leadership and community involvement would allow me to bring a practical, independent and community-focused voice to council.

Q: What is your vision for the future of Minden Hills - and how would you bring that about?

A: My vision is a Minden Hills that remains affordable, welcoming and distinctly rural while providing the services and infrastructure residents need and expect.

Growth is important, but it should be responsible growth that strengthens our community rather than changing the qualities that brought people here in the first place. We need to support local businesses and tourism, protect our lakes and environment, maintain reliable roads and infrastructure, and ensure our emergency services have the resources they need.

I would bring that vision to council by listening first, asking difficult questions and making decisions based on evidence, affordability and long-term value. I want residents to understand not only what council decides, but why.

Most importantly, I want Ward 2 residents to know they have an accessible councillor who will return calls, listen to concerns and bring their voices to the council table.

Q: What do you think is the biggest issue in your township and how would you go about tackling it?

A: I believe affordability is one of the biggest challenges facing Minden Hills; not only the affordability of living here, but the affordability of municipal government itself.

Residents are facing higher costs for housing, food, fuel, insurance and everyday necessities. Municipal taxes and fees are part of that pressure, so council has a responsibility to demonstrate that every tax dollar is being spent carefully.

The township's affordability and governance review provides an important opportunity to examine how we deliver services, where efficiencies can be found, and whether our current structure gives residents the best value possible.

I would approach that discussion with an open mind. This should not simply be about cutting services. It should be about delivering them smarter, reducing duplication, setting clear priorities, and planning for the long-term.

Residents deserve good services, responsible taxation, and a municipal government that is transparent and accountable for how it spends their money.

Ward 2 – John McNeil

Q: What are your qualifications to run for council?

A: I am a local homeboy who grew up here. I care for the residents in the area. I help people first before helping myself. I'm a giver, not a taker. I fight for things that people need or want. I offer safety information on a Facebook site I own and operate. I have seven others working for me on that site. The site is for driving and information on roads, weather and tornado activities. In the winter months, it is extremely busy and helpful, but it operates in all seasons, it's called Cottage Country All Ontario Road & Weather Watch with 22,000 members plus. I also have a meteorologist working with me and the group. I have been a leader for eight years for my site.

Q: What is your vision for the future of Minden Hills - and how would you bring that about?

A: Over many years, I have seen Minden falling apart, meaning businesses have closed up, gone elsewhere, or just vanished from the area that we call home. I want to bring back a few things that we once had to make Minden more prosperous in resources and economy.

The vision for the new Minden for me: attractions and business. Without businesses or attractions, Minden would no longer be in business. I want to have new docks put in so that cottagers from Gull Lake and river can come to town by boat, to shop and dine out, to get their prescriptions or just to walk the Riverwalk or go to the arena and sports centre. We need to expand Minden's economy for growth, bring in more jobs.

I want to remove the old fire house and put in a water park for our children, even add a normal park downtown for when our tourists come to town, they can bring their children to the park or water park for some fun.

Q: What do you think is the biggest issue in your township and how would you go about tackling it?

A: We actually have two big problems within our town. First that has to be fixed is our flooding. I have a plan to stop the flooding, but it will take the government to step in also to fix these problems. The flooding takes a toll on our economy and our residents and their homes.

I would say how I would fix the problem, but that is for me to bring forth to our council once I am on council. Second is our downtown roads. Many of our entrances to downtown are rubbish; Water Street, Prince Street, Invergordon Avenue, McKnight Drive, St Germaine Street and Anson Street all need to be redone, torn up, built up and resurfaced. This cannot be done until the flooding problem is solved and fixed.

The Hip: cottage country anthems

Many Canadians can remember exactly where they were on Aug. 20, 2016. A decade later, after The Tragically Hip walked off the stage for the last time in Kingston, Ont., Gord Downie's voice can still be heard across the vast lakes of Haliburton County.

"In a lot of people's minds, they're Canada's greatest band," Haliburton's MooseFM host Rick Lowes said.

On Aug. 20, MooseFM joined dozens of radio stations to mark the 10th anniversary of the band's final show. The station dedicated a three-hour block to playing nothing but The Hip.

For Lowes, dedicating a massive chunk of afternoon airtime to the iconic Ontario rockers wasn't a complex programming decision; it was simply common sense.

"Certainly, a lot of our listeners listen to The Hip... it just seemed like the logical move," Lowes explained.

With the age-old debate about what is the country's greatest band, the host points to the bond between The Hip and small-town audiences, especially in cottage country.

"The Hip have a special place in Canada's heart, I think, because they made it huge in Canada, but they really didn't pursue any kind of career outside of the country," Lowes said. "So many of their songs are so relatable to every Canadian."

The Hip's legacy isn't just felt across local airwaves; it's alive on stages across the Highlands. For father-son duo VanHillert, The Hip represents pure Canadian rock, and a shared interest that spans generations.

The father reflected on seeing the band before they were a household name, during

a summer gig at Wasaga Beach in July 1986.

"They were nobody," Chris Hillert told *The Highlander* before a gig at Minden's Boshkung Social.

"They played at the Dardanella, and downstairs was this little schlocky pool hall. The first impression was [Gord] had a piece of plywood that he used to stand on, stomping his feet around like Stompin' Tom [Connors]. He kind of reminded me of Jim Morrison. That kind of stuck with me. If you were to define that sound, that Canadian rock sound, that's The Hip."

For Owen Hillert, drummer in VanHillert, the connection to the Kingston band was formed during that final night a decade ago.

Nearly twelve million people tuned in to watch the final concert that was aired on the CBC.

"It was kind of sombre," Chris said. "We all knew what was going on. We really absorbed it."

Owen was just eight years old at the time. "I watched that whole thing, and that's what really got me into them. Now we play a bunch of their songs," Owen said.

For local performers, Hip tracks aren't just covers; they're cottage country anthems. When VanHillert rips into songs like "Blow At High Dough," the reaction in the room is instant.

"They pay attention more to The Hip than anything," Owen said. "It's a universal ring bell for their minds to just focus on."

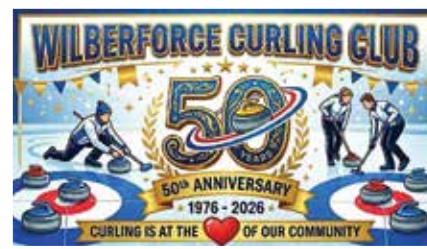
"Whenever we play it, it's the biggest response of the night," his father added. "I don't know, it's just a universal language up here."

Downie was diagnosed with terminal brain cancer in December 2015. He died on Oct. 17, 2017, at the age of 53.

Why we made it

Three years ago, Meta banned Canadian media companies from Facebook and Instagram. Since then, the quality of information on these platforms has deteriorated. Instead of trustworthy news, there is misinformation, anger, and division. We believe that's bad for Haliburton County.

We created this app to solve that problem: to make a space that is just for our community, without the downsides of social media.

What's on it

You'll find verified, accurate news from our reporters, including breaking news alerts. You will also find information from local not-for-profits, service organizations and municipalities. The feed is in strict chronological order – there's no algorithm to track or manipulate you.

How to get it

The best way is to go to thehighlander.app on your cellphone. On your first visit, you'll get a message encouraging you to install the app on your phone. Click this and the app will appear on your home screen so you can easily find it again.

How to use it

You don't need to create an account to use the app. But if you do, there are two benefits. First, you can choose which categories you want to see. Second, you can get notifications on your phone. There's a breaking news category, so anytime there is something urgent and important happening in the county, you can be notified. To create an account, just follow the links on the screen.

Why you can't comment on it

We know you might enjoy commenting on Facebook. But a downside of comments is that misinformation can spread. Without moderation, which is an impossible job for us, the value of the app would be lost. The Highlander's reporters are trained journalists, which means they follow rules so that what they post is as accurate as possible. They are also accountable because they live and work in our community. If they make a mistake, readers tell us – and we fix it. We hope that this approach will create an environment that is useful and pleasant.

Making it feel more like 'here'

When we built our house, we left a bit of spare driveway open. It was covered in gravel but nothing else. This, we decided, would be useful extra parking space.

Except we didn't need it so it never was. It has changed over the years. The first few seasons, it was what we'd call weedy. Dandelions with bright flowers but promising trouble. Thistles that said unkempt. I pulled them sometimes, if I could deal with the spines and roots.

This year, however, it is something else. It's a kind of raucous meadow, a jostle of leaves and flowers. No parking there.

You wouldn't expect much to be growing there because of the gravel, but now it's August and the goldenrod are blooming.

This plant is much maligned by some humans because we say it causes allergies (it doesn't). But it's loved by insects because of its pollen. It's a plant of disturbed areas. While it might not be the first to get there, it comes pretty soon after. Canada goldenrod – the most aggressive species – can quickly become something of a monoculture.

There are other goldenrods around my driveway, however. You've got to look closely to tell the difference.

Wrinkle-leaf goldenrod, zig-zag goldenrod for under the shade: neither of these is as aggressive as its maple-leaf wearing cousin.

Behind the goldenrod is a patch of bee balm. I don't know how it got there. Maybe I planted some and forgot, or maybe I threw some leftover seeds. Whatever, it's growing like gangbusters in the beds I tried to grow tomatoes in (too shaded, too deer-y.) The purple of the bee balm contrasts with the yellow of the goldenrod. Opposite sides of the colour wheel, I guess.

More yellow comes from evening primrose. This has been popping up on the driveway since day one. Sometimes I pulled it (too tall, too many seeds). Sometimes I left it (cool flowers). Now there are at least half a dozen plants.

All the time the lake is 180 degrees behind me. I just don't find it as interesting as I did.

We bought this lot for the view, not the driveway. I guess I could have maintained

this driveway patch – kept on top of the weeds, rolled back and forward with my car tires. But for whatever reason, I didn't. Maybe I was being lazy or maybe somewhere deep down I knew this is where nature was headed with its mix of non-native and native plants: coltsfoot, dandelions, yarrow, evening primrose. Raspberries. Poplar.

It's what I look at now.

Conifers

I often get called to new-build cottages to see how I can plant their landscapes. The most common request is make it feel more like "here".

A few decades ago, new cottages came with lawn and conical conifers, the pattern of the suburbs transplanted up 35. Because that's what we knew.

Today's new builds have cottages that nod to our trees, and landscapes that recognize our rocks, yet they still feel inevitably imposed – which is why people want them softened. Because they came for Haliburton, not Hamilton.

This is why I spend a lot of time looking at what's already growing around the property. It's what the land wants to become. And it's a clue to what to plant.

It means we can skip the thistle stage and the goldenrod monoculture.

Meanwhile, our county's roads are lined with a dusty pink these days. That's Joe-Pye weed, which likes the moisture found in our ditches.

Road crews dig the ditches from time to time to keep them clear but the Joe-Pye weed comes back.

Because that's what Joe-Pye weed does.

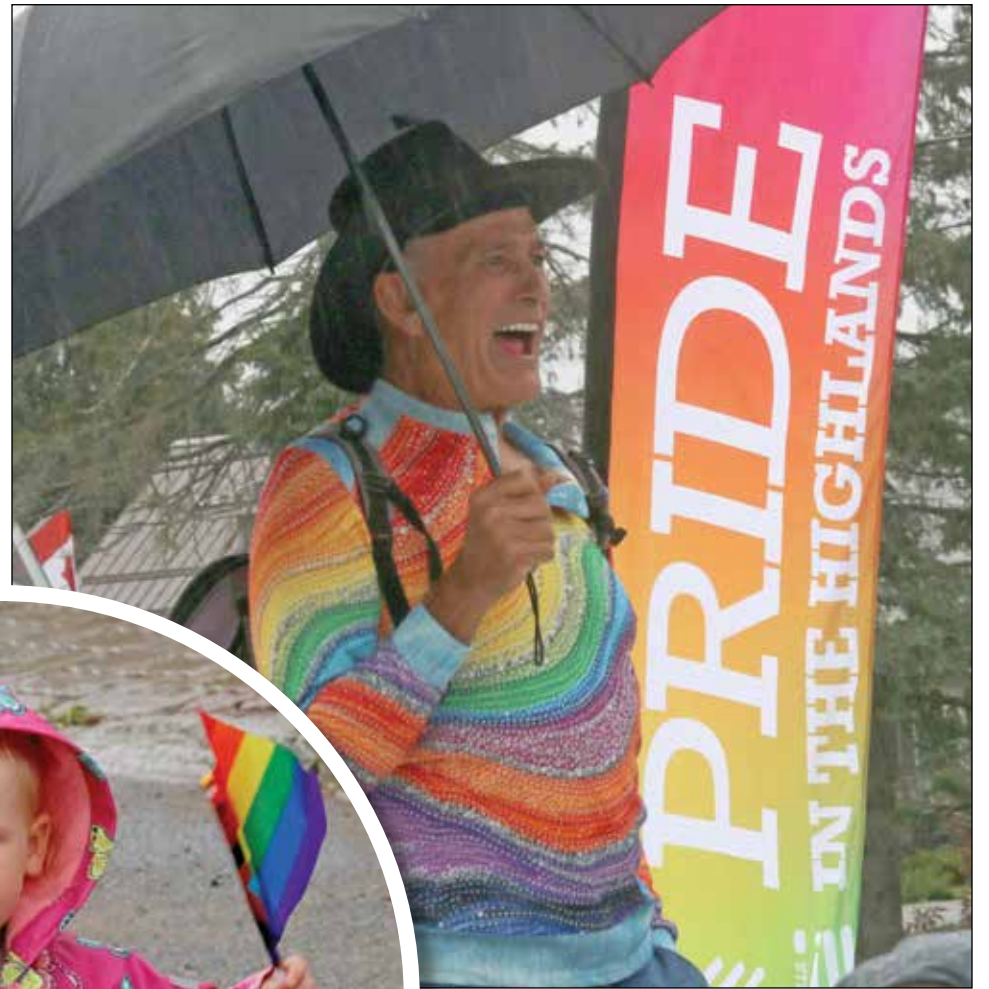

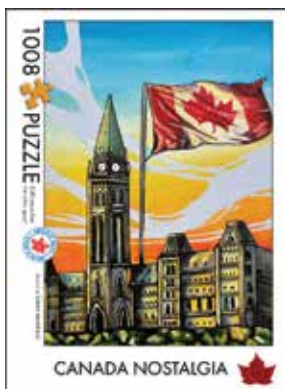
